



**GLEN S. FUKUSHIMA**  
**SENIOR VICE PRESIDENT, AIRBUS SAS**  
**PRESIDENT AND CHIEF EXECUTIVE OFFICER, AIRBUS JAPAN K.K.**

Glen S. Fukushima was appointed Senior Vice President, Airbus SAS and President and Chief Executive Officer, Airbus Japan K.K., in February 2005. In this position, he is responsible for all Airbus activities in Japan and chairs the Board of Directors of Airbus Japan K.K.

Before joining Airbus in 2005, Mr. Fukushima served as president of the Japan operations of NCR Corporation, Cadence Design Systems, Inc., and Arthur D. Little, Inc. Until 1998, he was Vice President of the Japan operations of AT&T Corporation. Before embarking on his business career in 1990, he was based in Washington, D.C. as Director for Japanese Affairs (1985-1988) and Deputy Assistant United States Trade Representative for Japan and China (1988-1990) at the Office of the United States Trade Representative (USTR), Executive Office of the President. He began his career as an attorney at a prominent Los Angeles law firm.

Mr. Fukushima served two terms as President of the American Chamber of Commerce in Japan (ACCJ), 1998-1999, and Vice President, 1993-1997. He has served on numerous corporate boards and government advisory councils in the United States, Europe, and Japan. He also sits on the Board of the Japan Association of Corporate Executives, the Japan Forum on International Relations, the America-Japan Society, and the Japanese American National Museum. Until June 2001, was for eight years Vice Chairman of the Japan-United States Friendship Commission and Vice Chairman of the U.S. panel of CULCON (Joint Committee on United States-Japan Cultural and Educational Interchange).

Mr. Fukushima's publications include *Nichi-Bei Keizai Masatsu no Seijigaku* [The Politics of U.S.-Japan Economic Friction], winner of the 9<sup>th</sup> Masayoshi Ohira Memorial Prize in 1993. He received the "Excellence 2000" Award from the U.S. Pan Asian American Chamber of Commerce in 1999 and the "Alumni Hall of Fame" Award from Stanford University in 2002.

A native of California, Mr. Fukushima was educated at Deep Springs College, Stanford University, Harvard University Graduate School of Arts and Sciences, Harvard Business School, and Harvard Law School. He has studied and worked in Japan for over 25 years, including at Keio University, a daily newspaper, an international law firm, and as a Fulbright Fellow and a Japan Foundation Fellow at

the Faculty of Law, University of Tokyo. In his free time he likes to travel, play tennis, attend concerts, visit museums, and browse bookstores. He and his wife, Sakie Tachibana Fukushima, met at the 22<sup>nd</sup> Annual Japan-America Student Conference in 1970.
